The Story of Four Hoppers and the opening of the Ajax Football Stadium

I want to take you back, way back into time, back to 1996. That's right, 29 years ago and nearly three decades. In the UK Peter Andre (Flava) was just about to knock off the Spice Girls (wannabe) who had sat at number one in the charts for some seven weeks. In Holland on the 14th August there was a grand opening of the Brand-new Ajax Football Club stadium which would be a grand affair with some broadcast content. Basking in their glory of winning the champions league trophy in the 94/95 season, Ajax wanted the naming of the "Johan Cruiijff Arena" to be a worthy event, and so preparations started early on how to make the most of this 55,885-seat platform. Now please bear with me because some of what follows may not be factually correct and is assumed, but they got an idea to involve four Cloudhoppers and the name associated with the deal was a Dutchman by the name of Hans Zoek. Hans contacted Ultramagic with a plan, probably in late 1995, which was processed through the German dealer believed to be Peter Housmann. What was commissioned was the purchase of four relatively new models to Ultramagic in four H-42'. Each balloon had the primary colours of the team and the capacity to be bannered. These would sport the liveries of some of the principle sponsors of Ajax. I guess the associated costs were shared amongst those prestigious clients who received good TV airtime for their participation in the stunt.

As a major part of the naming /opening ceremony all four Non-registered balloons would be inflated over small baskets as part of the grand ceremony. The impact of four pristine red and white envelopes in the arena cannot be understated. Such companies as Coca-Cola, Grolsch, Phillips and PTT Telecom would be exposed on national television in all their glory. Other companies also featured on the balloons such as Ballast Needam and Staatsloterij.

Once this event was completed they were then stored by Mr Zoek without further use until his sad demise and the family needed to get rid of them. Now this was sometime after the great tether and whilst in the process of arranging their sale, Pieter Kooistra was asked to assist in moving them on. In the period between tethering and the sale, logbooks went missing and so the sale wasn't as straight forward as you would imagine. The four associated Balloons were envelope only sales of c/n's 42/3- 42/6 inclusive.

Sadly, I can't tell you which envelope had which advertising upon it but by the time of the future sales all banners had been removed.

<u>Subsequent History of the Hoppers</u>

Um H-42 - 42/3

This balloon made its way onto the UK register in 2007 when it was registered G-OOCH which was very apt as the owner was Peter Gooch. Peter kept the balloon using it lightly for a period of nearly six years starting on the 6th September 2007. This was subsequently sold to David Such in July of 2013. As the second owner David used the envelope for some 25 months selling on to its third UK owner Linda Crossland-Clarke. Linda kept the envelope 26 months before selling it to Kate Holzer with only 34 hours total time accrued. Kate who lived abroad then exported the envelope to Switzerland where it still resides as HB-QVQ. This was seen as recently as 2018 at Chateau D'oex sporting other bannering. Many Thanks to Sandy Mitchell for the Photo. Considered still active.

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<u>UM H-42- 42/4</u>

This envelope was one of the two taken to Germany. Registered D-OOUM it has consequentially been seen at places like Metz. It has been married to both a hopper bottom end and on occasions a small basket. Seen photographed on various Metz outings by Kevin Boon(many thanks), in 2009 it was with a basket, by 2013 it was under a hopper bottom end and then in 2019 it was back under a basket. Considered still active.

UM H-42- 42/5

This particular envelope has probably the best history of the four with Pieter Kooistra confirming before it sold to the UK, it went back to Ultramagic Spain to be checked over and re issued with a logbook before coming to the UK for its first owner Andrew Davidson. Registered on the 7th March 2014, (some 7 years



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after the other UK example) Andrew flew it regularly until 19th July 2018 when it became the property of Ian Chadwick who still utilises the craft currently. Whilst it may have had a recent "event" the balloon has been repaired and is still airworthy.

This envelope is the second one that found its way to Germany. Registered D-OBRA, there is some real mystery to its history after the Tether in Holland. The Balloon had been seldom seen in action and has subsequently been placed as withdrawn from use with its registration reallocated subsequently. Despite the best efforts of people like Tony Jay (thanks), Little is known about this one and why it was withdrawn from use. We all love intrigue but surely someone, somewhere, knows more. If that is you, please get in touch with the news. Many thanks to lan Chadwick for his input to this topic.

First Flights- By Steve Roake

When I say first flights, I really mean when you can recall your first ever proper experience in a Cloudhopper and whilst this wasn't my first ever outing in a hopper, I hadn't learnt much by this stage and nearly came a cropper due to my naivety. My first ever outing in a Colt 31 (G-IMAN) happened in January 2005 in Mauterndorf Austria with another near-death experience. This has been documented before but revolved around the balloon which had been lent to me, and being told it was refuelled, wasn't. I nearly came to grief over high power lines and luckily landed in deep snow having curled around a snow laden tree which assisted in me walking away. Since that day I have ingrained in me Never to trust what anyone says about fuel status and do my own preflight checks.

The flight didn't bother me too much as I had identified the failure and taken on board what to do to ensure it never happened again. Months later I found myself at Cameron Balloons Bristol, where I was purchasing a Lovely orange Colt 31 from Chris Monk(G-BSDV) and getting those with greater knowledge than me to give it the once over. (Colin Wolstenholme and Andy Booth graciously gave up their time to inspect the craft in Cameron's third floor loft space). The most important information I came away with was that the balloon had turning vents. I held on to it until my brand new Lindstrand Mk 2 Hopper bottom end had been built and delivered and because of the turning vents, I had agreed to fix the burner in place negating the ability to swivel the bottom end but having the componentry to be able to go so whenever I wished in the future.

This I followed up with a 45min tether at my kids' school annual fate and a 45 min free flight from Cheriton Hampshire and an overall 65 hours of P1 experience. What could possibly go wrong?



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My next outing was to be at the Savernake Forrest meet on 24th September with three friends who also had hoppers. It was the Harvest Moon event run by Rob Cross, a back to basics, no frills balloon meet and the weather was splendid. Setting up the 31 next to three other hoppers got my juices flowing. To one side of me was Neil Iviison with his lovely relatively new Lindstrand 25A G-RIME, whilst flanking me on the other side were Kevin Tanner in G-HOPR (also an LBL25A) and John Hilditch in G-CBZJ his ex-demo Lindstrand 25A. We decided to take off together, so inflated at our own rate and then waited until the last one was ready to go. It must have made a good sight as four craft ascended in unison for what for me would only be a 45min flight. I remember the windspeed whilst airborne was around 8 knots and laughed out loud when John got stuck in some trees whilst playing around low level.

About 20 mins into my flight I thought I ought to practise my landing as I hadn't really any experience of doing this phase of the flight. Being the idiot, I was, I saw a field and initiated a descent towards a prospective landing spot. What I hadn't contemplated was the orientation of my craft or how slowly and inefficient the turning vents were with such small lift capacity. Heading directly into said field I had no time to turn the craft and upon touchdown my foot proceeded to get trapped under the seat nearly busting my ankle. The only thing that saved me (on the day), was the fact that I thought the flight was too short and I had in mind to fly on and so adding lift took the pressure off what would have been a catastrophic outcome. Flying on with a foot that was severely protesting made me realise what a fool I had been. My next attempt (my full stop landing) saw me by a road with my crew(Jack Reddall) in attendance with the car so prior to my approach I set up the balloon at 45 degrees to my track and then descended. Fortunately, I got it right and landed fine but swearing to Jack about my state of pain.

So, what did I learn from the experience?

First thing I learned was never approach directly with turning vents. Secondly check the rip line isn't trapped around the burner block prior your approach. Thirdly orientate the balloon prior any descent. Finally, to try and achieve a two-step approach when over trees, i.e. descend to tree top height then continue into the chosen spot early in the length of the field in a secondary motion. Subsequently I removed the turning vents and returned my bottom end to swivel configuration giving me more scope to adjust my orientation and realising that I wanted to retain as much lift capacity as possible just in case the need to fly on



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occurred.

Nothing against turning vented balloons but in small ones they aren't for me. So that was my egg on face fourth outing in a hopper and the score was two for two, two good ones, two near disasters. Live and learn they say, hopefully not in my manner for you guys.

News from Cameron Balloons, there is another hopper that has just been delivered. Registered on the 27th November, G-CNCX is a Cameron O-31 (c/n 12808) and is registered to David Head. This joins their stock hopper option which is still available for purchase. This brings the number produced in 2025 up to three.

Having only 39hours total time in 51 flights on the craft, this 2021 built balloon is hardly run in,
