2, Essential Extras – The “Bag for Life”

This might sound crazy but I'm always finding people who don't know what I mean about the “bag for life” when it comes to ballooning, as was the case recently when I was at Headcorn Kent. This works just as well for a big balloon as for a hopper but it's simple folks.



Take one 10p more robust reusable plastic bag from your local supermarket (or if you feel like splashing the cash a natural fibre one for about £4 from Waitrose), and take it with you when you next go fly.

What's it for? What you do is you stow away your crown line up to and including the crown ring inside the bag which then gets tucked inside the fabric of your balloon. Why? The reason for doing this is two-fold. If the rope gets wet at all it isn't going to damage any

of the panels(mildew), and secondly if you feed the rope into the bag in one continuous motion, it won't get knotted when you pull it out again next time.

A very simple idea but perfect for an "Essential Extra" hence the reason It's being suggested to you right here for making your ballooning that little bit better. Like most good ideas it costs next to nothing.

3, The Features Section. –

Cheltenham Balloon Festival

The first Cheltenham Balloon festival took place over the weekend of 21st-23rd July based at the renowned race course site. Hosted by John Tyrrell and Wendy Rousell (who run the OMM), you knew in advance it would be well organised. Alas on the Friday evening, my trip to the event was protracted as I had to come directly from where I was working in Littlehampton (a trip that should have taken 2 hours for the 140 miles distance, any yet took over 4 hours), and so my first indication that I was close was when I witnessed around 12 balloons airborne from a Local landmark called The Balloon Pub which is pitched high on a local set of hills. I was taking the Cloudhopper purely to fly on the Saturday am slot as I had offered to P1 Tara Taylor in her bigger balloon for the rest of the weekend. Setting up my camping arrangements with balloons in the air around you is a great sight although in your heart of hearts you wished you could be up there too.

Some 50 odd balloons had agreed to attend which for a first ever event is a great number, and I wasn't too bothered as the Saturday am slot looked as though it would be glorious. This arrived with pretty much the predicted weather which was light winds, an inversion and no reason not to fly. My crew for the slot were Tony Taylor and Dan Leek who had driven up from Cardiff first thing that morning.

This would be my first ever flight with electronic maps at my disposal and so, I was keen to get into the "new age" with the necessary details displayed on my I-phone. There was no hurry to fly as the winds were light on the surface but should you want to go somewhere, the 2000 ft winds were around 10 knots. Joined by my fellow hopper

James McDonald organises a Flyout from Headcorn Kent.

Saturday 13th July was the planned first gathering of a club of balloonists brought together by James McDonald. Cinque Port is a club of like-minded people who want to fly together in Kent and for this first outing Id been invited to join them at Headcorn Airfield for what would turn into a nice balloon flyout. Apparently, years ago they did this sort of thing and James is trying to get Flying back on the agenda in Kent once more as a social event. I was to fly the Cameron Cloudhopper with local balloonist Peter Greaves agreeing to be my crew for the evening. This is a great move because Peter is a budding future hopper pilot and wants to take a closer look at the kit. With his family and friends present I have a large team to assist me which is great and I can see its turning into a really good social affair. We all wait for the winds to dissipate a bit and around 7-15pm time and winds are right and it's time to fly. We all leave en mass and head south westerly at around 7-8knots. The visibility on the evening was fantastic with id estimate over 40kms of vis. One of the first away was a local rides balloon and I track the Kubicek BB45 as I happen to be inline with the bigger balloon. Listening to him talking on the radio to his crew, I gather there is ample landing spots around the town of Cranbrook and whilst I don't get into the school playing fields that he has picked, soon alternatives come along. The first choice was a field with little or no access so based on Peters advice I fly on. The next possibility is more like it, with baled hay in the field as I home in on my landing spot. As I fly over some copse I actually find a smaller field next to a house and select that one as perfect. Such was the drop off in the winds, behind the tree line I had a stand-up landing. The owner a lovely lady called Eve is the perfect host who sent me photos after the event. Keen to engage Peter with the hopper bug (which he already has), we took the opportunity to give him some ten minutes tether time as the

One who was is David Head who has to be the most prolific hopper pilot I know. In two years with his Cameron O-31 G-CJIX, he has run up a massive 80 hours plus usage. I don't know of anyone who has flown the socks off their hopper in such a way and he is so keen. He flew at least two of the slots and enjoyed the experience tremendously. Note, as you can see from the photograph he is one of a few select people I know who flies with an 80 litre V40 tank.

One slot was towards Catterick on a northerly track and whilst not too much crop had been cut all who flew managed to find decent landing places. The second slot was more easterly with the prevailing winds taking balloons towards RAF Leeming. My reason for not flying was that I was flying the 120 and not the hopper and rain coupled with an inability to dry it out after the event made me circumspect.

However, don't get the impression I didn't have a good time because nothing could be further from the truth. Great socialising ensued and James McDonald assisted me in becoming electronic on the maps front. This has been a long drawn out affair and my lack of computer skills limited the ability to sort myself out, but at least now the deed is done.

Metz 2019

By the time you read this a large proportion of you will have made the Journey to Metz for the bi annual festival of Mondial du Lorraine. I hope that the weather gods treat you well and that the trend I experienced over the last few years reverses and that you get more flying than I experienced over the last few years.

I have had the pleasure of the festival for the past 10 occasions and seen a lot of changes and for me personally "the formula" hasn't stimulated me enough to want to return on this occasion. Part of my reason is that the French authorities didn't really embrace our attempt to create the world record for the number of hoppers in the air at any one time. So, they mucked us around and could have fulfilled the objective early on in the 10 days when the weather was perfect but chose not to string me along with excuses. In the end, we succeeded under duress when their precious line up was more important nullifying the opportunity for a large proportion of hopper pilots to get involved.

My Relationship with Cameron Balloons

As you may remember two years ago this month I entered into a working relationship with Cameron Balloons to cover the record attempt in Lorraine and ongoing with support for both the brand and my newsletter and the website. To support this process, I sold my old balloon set up and embraced the occasion by buying a Millennium Bottom end to go with the Cameron Branded envelope I was given the use of. G-CJWY, has been a very integral part of the deal and over the 24 months I've flown it 20 times for nearly 20 hours of use.

Like all good things, time has run its course and we have reviewed the relationship and so after July Cameron's no longer need me as their brand ambassador. They have agreed that in the last two years we have collectively helped the purchase of an increased number of hopper sales and projected the brand of super light balloons to a new level.

Whilst I am grateful for the opportunity to purchase G-CJWY for myself, after careful consideration I have decided that to own a branded balloon that I have no direct input with the company isn't the way I want to proceed and I also thought that the valuation they put against the envelope doesn't meet my valuation of a 2-year old balloon with 20 hours on it.

Moving forward, Cameron's say they would like my help with development of the product, they also say they want to still back the website and support the Newsletter. All of this remains to be discussed further and I think I will now have to look into trying to organise another purchase of an envelope for my needs. Clearly going forward, I wouldn't pick something commercially liveried as my choice unless it was seriously discounted in price and should I go down the route of buying new would obviously have my own preferred livery. I'm told there are a number of dealers who want a liveried envelope so I am returning it to Bristol within the next month.

I have no regrets with the last two years joint agreement, I am just surprised that it hasn't been extended, since the proposals that are being talked about are very similar to my existing role.

Going Forward, all I can say is watch this space!
